Happy New Year to everyone. I want to personally thank you all for your hard work and dedication in 2016. Thanks to everyone's efforts, we experienced a very successful year. Our company met and exceeded both our target growth and operating income goals. These achievements could not have been accomplished without all of you.



Benefit Information Highlight:

Just a reminder: You can only make changes to your benefit plans during Open enrollment in October of each year unless you have a Qualifying Event. Qualifying Events are: Marriage, Birth, Death, Divorce, previous insurance coverage ends, change in spouse's job status, spouse gains or loses insurance and adoption. You have 30 days from the time of the Qualifying Event to change coverage or you will be required to wait until open enrollment to change coverage. You will also need to provide supporting documents for the Qualifying Event such as Marriage/Birth Certificate, Divorce Decree, Death Certificate or Certificate of Credible Coverage from the insurance carrier. Hello from Job 1796.

We are getting close to the end of our project here in Georgia. It has been a nice project to be a part of for the last year and a half. We have had some ups and downs both personally and professionally. We have had some new blood getting into the Apprenticeship Program continuing our tradition of passing knowledge to the next generation. We have welcomed some new leadership and have seen some friends leave us. Along the way, I hope that we continue to grow, improve and exceed in all of our goals.

We have made a lot of progress. All towers have been set and back bolted (193 towers in total). We have pulled 154,066' of Conductor, sagged 116 Structures, clipped 103 Structures, put spacers in between 77 structures and installed all of the log anchors needed for the project. We are sitting at 70-80 percent job completion.

We will be finished at the beginning of May 2017 and heading to our next adventure. I hope the next project that we take on will be as successful as this endeavor has been.

Greetings from Oklahoma,

Congratulations to Dexter Lee on being selected as Construction Employee of the Quarter.

We are off to an incredibly busy season building powerlines. So busy in fact, we have had to enlist the help of crews from other regions. A big thanks to Rick Shouse, Pat Shouse and Joel Votaw for loaning us some of their finest men. We are also excited to welcome some new faces to our Irby family here in Oklahoma. Here is a little bit of what our crews have been up to:

Job 1732 AEP Nashoba, OK: Irby's Nashoba crew led by Carl Bell and Randy Franks has successfully energized another 11.5 miles of 138kV Transmission Line rebuild and are working on the final 14.5 miles of what has been a 78-mile project running through Southeast Oklahoma. Rough terrain and weather has been the biggest obstacles faced, but the crews have met every challenge head on and have not missed a deadline yet! The crews received their outage on September 12th to complete the remaining 14.5 miles-134 Structures of the Broken Bow to Lone Oak 138kV rebuild.

Job 1844 GRDA Inola, OK: Working within a secure GRDA facility, Irby's crew led by Dean and Mike Anglum built three separate 345kV lines and reterminating an existing 345kV line that was originally routed around the complex. David Hulsey and crew did a great job on this project. This project demanded a great deal of work within the complex and in coordination with other contractors, subs and GRDA while staying focused and alert to get all tasks accomplished safely. Dean and David were able to string the last of the conductor and fiber, and the project is now complete. Mike and the majority of the crew have shifted to our AEP project in New Boston, TX (1884).

Job 1884 AEP New Boston, TX: This project was the new construction of 43.5 miles of 345kV transmission line starting at the Red River north of DeKalb, TX running to Texarkana, TX. This was the second half of the project--the first 35 miles were built in Oklahoma originating in Valliant, OK. We kicked this project off in mid-April with plans to knock it out by the end of the year. Luckily, we knew coming into this project that ground conditions were going to be difficult to say the least, with record setting rains occurring in the area over the past year. It was a busy summer for our crews in Texarkana, but we were able to get the job done. Erickson set an amazing 93 structures in five days with the support of Winco. We would like to thank Dwayne Gaddis, Randy Jones, Chris Swindoll and Brandon Cox along with their crews for the assistance they provided us on getting this job completed a month ahead of schedule. With all hands on deck we were able to string approximately 45 miles of conductor in a little less than three months.


Job 1889 AEP Chickasha, OK: We began another section of 138kV transmission line (rebuild) that ran from Chickasha, OK to Maud, OK. This project was led by Superintendent Tom Mehlin and Assistant Superintendent Donell Swanson. With almost 50 miles to knock out before the end of the year, we had a heck of a crew and we were able to get the job done. We finished up our first wire pull of the section early in the summer and had 14 miles completed by the end of July. We added a lot of fresh new faces to the family throughout this project who fell right into place and did a great job.

Job 1900/1916 AEP Slaughterville, OK: Tom Mehlin's crew has been busy in central Oklahoma on the Cornville to Maud Line. Since May 18, we have completed two 14-mile phases, each only taking 2 ½ months. We recently continued on to phase three totaling 19.5 miles and have put a major dent in it in a just a few weeks. Our deadline for the 22nd of December is looking brighter, especially with the help of Mike Dietz and his crew from Florida who joined the fun two weeks ago. We literally cannot thank our crew enough for all the effort and hard work they have put forth this past year. They have finished multiple deadlines way ahead of schedule and continue to impress us daily.

Job 1910 AEP Valliant, OK: With Superintendent Bobby Jones bouncing back and forth between Valliant and Texarkana, Tony Collins and crew have been knocking out some work on the Hugo- Valliant line. This is a rebuild job upgrading from 69kV to 138kV and changing out the existing wood poles to galvanized steel. After starting at the end of August, they will be hauled, framed and set out by Halloween. I cannot forget to mention their office clerk Gabriella Navarro. She does a great job at keeping these guys in line. We would also like to congratulate Stuart Angel and his wife on the birth of their son John Reid who arrived last fall.

Job 1913 AEP/TOSCO Tap Duncan, OK: The Duncan to Comanche line started in late August and is a 9.5 mile re-build job led by Dean and Mike Anglum with the support of David Hulsey and crew. These guys have been doing an outstanding job meeting deadlines to maintain their outage schedule, and the first three miles have been energized. The crew has hauled, framed and set all but a handful of poles and should start on the third wire pull in the next few weeks. These guys are getting it done in Duncan.

Job 1917 AEP Duncan, OK: Our Terry Road cutin project started in late September. Adam Godfrey
and his seasoned crew are doing an outstanding job
keeping this one on schedule, even with the minor
setback of not being able to find the correct size of
grips anywhere near Oklahoma. It only took a short
trip to Nebraska and they were back in business. They
should finish up in the next couple of weeks and then
move to job 1828 in Coweta, OK to complete the AEP
Coweta Junction Tap. These fellas really know how to
get a job done quickly.


That's about it from somewhere in TEXAS. Until next time Put safety first and GOD Bless.

Pampa, TX didn't realize the impact that Irby Construction would have on their dust bowl heritage. They've received more rain in the last few months than their normal average for an entire year. Pat Shouse has led the job and orchestrated a successful 24 mile monopole 345 kV project thus far. It started out dusty, but with the spring rains it has become a slippery slope. We are contracted to Burns and McDonnell on the project for Cross Texas Transmission (CTT). Josh Welch keeps an eye on safety and saved our bacon on safety submittals and updating AHA's to the customer. Cecil Jennings has recently joined the effort.

Luckily, Scott Baker and the yard crew in conjunction with the spotting crew, got everything out of the yard and delivered to the ROW prior to the monsoons. They were a well-oiled machine and finished their job task ahead of schedule. At the beginning of the job we experienced a hold up on concrete mix approval, but once received the foundation crew headed up by Shane Stephens, hit the ground running. The crew has 70 percent of the drilled pier foundations completed and is in the home stretch well in front of wire stringing. Aldridge, our subcontractor for the direct embed foundations, has also made excellent progress and has only five foundations remaining out of the original 123. Joe Larison and his pole setting crew are close on Aldridge's heals, progressing rapidly toward the last pole at 144 after setting structures 110 last week. We have a mix of great employees that made the beginning of the job a congenial, dedicated community. neighborhood took a hit when Chris Swindoll appeared to start wire pulling, but his crew and the addition of Brandon Cox, alias Hollywood, turned it around and we've managed to complete three wire pulls.

In conclusion, we cannot forget the stellar contributions of Leif Larson as our ever diligent QA/QC person and Adam Sparks for managing Aldridge. Also, our conscientious, attentive office staff Nicole Sparks and Gabriela Navarro, who keep us on the straight and narrow with respect to submittals and reporting to our customer, not to mention keeping us paid.

Greeting from San Marcos, Texas

Job #1817 - San Marcos, TX: Tommy Jinks, along with Gary Thornton and crew, are finishing up a 13 mile 138 KV double circuit rebuild that ran from Zorn to Seguin, TX. We have had numerous interruptions with this project due to bad weather (tornado and flooding) but Gary and Tommy kept the crews focused on the task at hand. The crews continued to push forward being productive while working safe to meet our project end date. Once we tie up all loose ends here in San Marcos, crews will be heading to Lake Travis.

Job #1887 - Lake Travis, TX: Crews will be installing 1.3 miles an (ACCR) Aluminum Conductor Composite Reinforced, segment over Lake Travis (Marshall Ford to Lago Vista). This is the first time we have worked with this particular type of wire. It sags at the same tension as the old wire, but it has 20-30 foot more clearance at midspan than the old wire. Our crews are very excited about this project as it is something new. This is a very popular lake and with school letting out, the traffic on the water and Marina will be extremely heavy. This will be a change of atmosphere for sure. Maybe we can convince Tommy to bring the pontoon boat out for the weekend

In closing, we would like to say "THANK YOU" to our crews who have worked extremely hard and continue to put safety first. We couldn't do it without each and every one of you doing your part, so keep up the good work guys. Also, we would like to congratulate Clay Scogin who just purchased his very first home. Congratulations!

AEP VICTORIA-FANNIN 69KV TL REBUILD JOB CREW

The south Texas AEP job kicked off on February 20th, but the steel crew under the direction of Chris Swindoll and Jose Meza, got a jump start on the project by three or four weeks. Reinforcement of 73 lattice towers that currently carries a double circuit line is nearing completion. A 138 kV line is on the opposite side of the tower from the 69 kV line which we are replacing. It will eventually also carry 138 kV. The new line calls for ACCC composite core wire which has a fragile core, requiring careful handling causing the owner to specify special larger blocks for the wire pull.

In addition, the job includes the installation of eight new concrete foundations (subcontractor CanFer) and associated steel poles which is just beginning with the official start date. Demo of the old lattice towers the steel poles replace is also part of the operation. In another segment of the line, the job includes replacement of arms on the 138 kV side of three existing poles as well as eight more arms on 345 kV poles on the west end of the project. The replacement of the 13 miles of 69kV wire will shortly follow with a projected finish date of May 20th.


